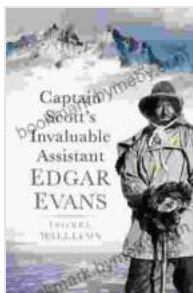


Captain Scott's Invaluable Companion: The Unsung Hero of Antarctic Exploration

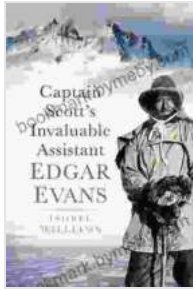


A memorial plaque honoring Edgar Evans, located at the South Pole.

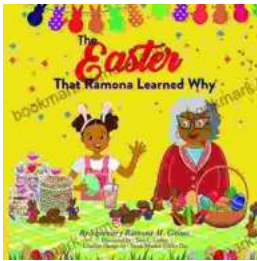

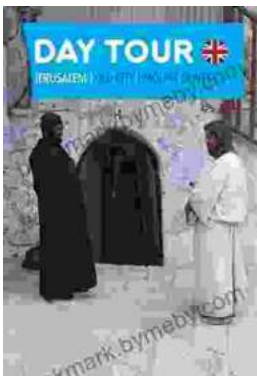
